From the Pastor's Desk

Stewardship Devotion: The Parable of the Talents

"Well done, good and faithful servant. You have been faithful over a little; I will set you over much. Enter into the joy of your master." (Matthew 25:21)

Over the last couple of months I've been writing in the newsletter about stewardship... I decided to end this series with a devotion—as we look forward to the challenges of expansion in the months ahead—based on Jesus' Parable of the Talents and tied to our tagline: **Connect. Grow. Multiply.** (Take a look—slowly, but surely, we're doing all three!)

Jesus tells a striking parable in Matthew 25 about a master who entrusts his servants with his wealth—five talents to one, two to another, and one to a third—each according to their ability. The first two servants invest what they've been given and double it. The third, fearing loss, buries his in the ground. When the master returns, he commends the faithful servants but condemns the one who refused to act.

This parable isn't just about money. It's about *stewardship*—the faithful management of everything God has entrusted to us: time, gifts, relationships, knowledge, opportunities, influence, and yes, finances. In the Kingdom of God, stewardship is not passive. It's active, expectant, and fruitful. God's economy is one of *multiplication*, not just maintenance...

CONNECT.

The master *entrusted* his servants with his riches. So too, God first connects us to Himself in grace. Everything we have flows from our relationship with Him. Our lives, our vocations, our congregations, our opportunities—they begin with the connection made by Jesus Christ, who laid down everything to redeem us. We are not owners of our blessings, but stewards. As Epiphany's mission begins with "Connect," so stewardship begins with the Gospel: being connected to the Giver.

GROW.

The servants who multiplied their talents took risks. They didn't stand still. In the same way, God calls us not to fear but to *grow* in faith and faithfulness. Growth doesn't always mean flashy results—it means exercising trust, obedience, and courage. At Epiphany,

Pastor's Note Continued

"Grow" is more than spiritual formation; it's also about growing in how we steward what God has given us—developing skills, deepening generosity, stretching our capacity for service, and allowing God to shape our priorities.

Martin Luther once said, "Faith is a living, daring confidence in God's grace." The faithful stewards in the parable lived that confidence. They acted because they trusted the character of their master. So too, we grow by acting in faith—not just preserving what God has given, but investing it in His Kingdom.

MULTIPLY.

When we connect to Christ and grow in His grace, multiplication happens. God's Word multiplies in people's hearts. Acts of kindness multiply into communities of compassion. Resources given in faith multiply into ministry. The first two servants were not praised for how much they earned but for *faithfulness with what they were given*. The multiplication was God's gift through their faithfulness.

Epiphany's tagline ends with "Multiply" because the Gospel is never meant to end with us. Just as Jesus sent His disciples to make more disciples, He sends us to multiply grace, hope, and love in our neighborhoods and beyond. Our time, talents, and treasures are Kingdom seeds—planted in faith and multiplied by God.

A Final Word

In the end, the greatest reward for faithful stewardship is not more stuff—but the Master's joy: "Enter into the joy of your master." Stewardship is not a chore; it's a calling into joy. As we <u>connect</u> to Christ, <u>grow</u> in faith, and <u>multiply</u> what He has entrusted to us, we experience the deep satisfaction of living lives that matter...eternally.

what's happening in children's Synday School?

Children's Sunday School is for those in preschool through 5^{th} grade. We typically start together to learn our lesson of day, then split into two groups (pre-K to 2^{nd} and 3^{rd} to 5^{th}) to finish the rest of our activities.

*Youth in 6th grade and above are encouraged to attend the Adult Sunday School class in the Santcuary.



The Enduring Faith Bible Curriculum, by CPH features a Christ-centered, three-year chronological survey of Bible history with a goal of helping our children grow deeper in their understanding of God's Word. Unit 7 starts exploring the New Testament. This exploration continues into Unit 8.

August 30 (Lesson 12) "A Confident Confession" is the title of today's lesson. Jesus asks His disciples two very direct questions: "Who do people say I am?" and "Who do you say I am?" (Matthew 16:13, 15). Peter's bold confession, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God" (v. 16), prompts Jesus to commend his words and proclaim this truth as the rock upon which the Church will be built. When Jesus foretells His death and resurrection, Peter objects and becomes a hindrance to Jesus' mission. Jesus rebukes Peter and keeps His focus on the cross.

September 7 (Lesson 13) Today, we will study "A Mountaintop Wonder." Jesus takes His inner circle—Peter, James, and John—up on a mountain. There, they see Jesus in His heavenly glory as Moses and Elijah appear alongside Him, discussing His upcoming departure. In his excitement, Peter offers to build three tents so they can remain on the mountaintop. Suddenly, a cloud—a sign of God's presence—appears and a voice speaks out from it: "This is My Son, My Chosen One; listen to Him!" (Luke 9:35).

September 14 (Lesson 14) In today's lesson, "Mission Wonders," Jesus gathers seventy-two followers and sends them out to the surrounding towns and villages. Taking nothing with them, these disciples depend on the willing welcome of local residents. There they remain, healing and spreading God's Word. Returning from their mission, the seventy-two rejoice in the many miracles they witnessed. Jesus reminds them to rejoice in their salvation.

September 21 (Unit 8, Lesson 1) "A Welcome Truth" Mary and Martha - Jesus and His disciples visit the home of sisters Mary and Martha. Mary sits at the Lord's feet to hear His words. Martha, busy with meal preparations, asks Jesus to tell Mary to help. Instead, Jesus gently tells Martha that Mary has chosen the more important thing.

September 28 (Unite 8, Lesson 2) "Lost-And-Found Wonders" Jesus shares three parables demonstrating our heavenly Father's concern for the lost.

A Survey of Christian Doctrine, Part 2: Natural and Revealed Knowledge of God

How does a person come to know God? If there is a God, can humans know him or know what he is like? What does God expect from me? Does he have a plan for my life? Questions like these have been asked by peoples of every culture, in every language throughout human history. But can they be answered? Can a person ever be sure that his or her answer is the right one? These are significant questions that need to be taken seriously, but the answers do not lie within those who ask them. True answers to these questions are found in the true God who reveals himself to us and calls us to believe. God reveals himself to humanity on his own terms. He questions us, judges us, forgives us, encourages us, and reveals himself to us with words and actions that we can understand.

When something is revealed it becomes known, uncovered, or brought to light. When people speak of a revelation of God, they often feel that they have "uncovered something" about God. To many, it is as if God is hiding and they have to find him. The biblical idea of revelation is exactly the opposite. It does not focus on humanity's search but on God's desire to communicate—to be known personally and certainly by his world. He searches for us (Luke 15:8-10). He takes the initiative. The pertinent question, then, is "How does God make himself known to the world he created?" Scripture answers that God reveals himself in two ways: natural knowledge (or general revelation) and revealed knowledge from God himself (also known as special revelation or supernatural revelation).

What can be known of God if he has not spoken directly to us? When people speak about "knowing God," they often base their claims on some personal experience or overpowering feeling. They "know God" through the beauty of a sunset, the majesty of the mountain peaks or the incredible order of the universe. They "know God" through the moral order of society or the uniqueness of human reason and love. In Christian theology, this is called the natural knowledge of God. It is information that is revealed through God's "fingerprints" in creation.

Because human beings are constantly looking in the wrong places and listening to the wrong voices, God must speak clearly if sinners are to hear him, know him and believe. The good news is that God does speak clearly. Revealed knowledge is God's direct communication of himself in history and ultimately in the Scriptures. The Bible is not just a book about God. It tells of his mighty acts and saving words by which he redeems and restores a fallen humanity and creation. From Genesis to Revelation, the Bible de-scribes the God who reveals himself in words and actions that people can understand. In the Scriptures one not only finds the reality of God, his righteous, holy character, but also his saving work and eternal purposes for sinful and lost humanity.
