OUR COMMUNION POLICY:

Our Lord invites to his table those who trust his words, repent of all sin, and set aside any refusal to forgive and love as he forgives and loves us, that they may show forth his death until he comes.

Because those who eat and drink our Lord’s body and blood unworthily do so to their great harm and because Holy Communion is a confession of the faith which is confessed at this altar, any who are not yet instructed, in doubt, or who hold a confession differing from that of this congregation and The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod, and yet desire to receive the sacrament, are asked first to speak with the pastor.

AS WE PREPARE FOR WORSHIP THIS MORNING:

God Manifests His Glory in the Humility and Weakness of Christ Crucified

The Lord tells His people, *“I brought you up from the land of Egypt and redeemed you from the house of slavery”* (Micah 6:4). By the sacrifice of His beloved Son, He has redeemed us from our slavery of sin and death; He has forgiven our transgressions by the shedding of His blood. His great mercy and salvation lead us *“to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly”* with our God (Micah 6:8). We boast only in the incarnate and crucified Lord Jesus. He is *“the power of God and the wisdom of God”* (1 Cor. 1:24). He is our life and salvation, our *“wisdom”* and *“righteousness and sanctification and redemption”* (1 Cor. 1:30). Now He opens His mouth and teaches us His wisdom. By His cross and Passion, the kingdom of heaven is ours. We receive mercy and are satisfied; we see God and are called sons of God in Christ. *“Blessed are you,”* therefore, *“when others revile you and persecute you and utter all kinds of evil against you falsely”* on account of Christ (Matt. 5:11).





What does ‘church’ mean in the New Testament?

When we hear the word *church*, many of us instinctively picture a building—brick and mortar, steeple and sign, pews and pulpit. But when we open the New Testament, we discover something both simpler and far richer. The Bible’s word for *church* is not first about a structure, but about a people.

The New Testament word translated *church* is the Greek *ekklesia*, meaning “an assembly” or “those called out.” It was a common word in the ancient world, used for gatherings of citizens called together for a purpose. The Holy Spirit takes this everyday word and fills it with gospel meaning. The Church is the assembly called together by God—not by geography, preference, or personality, but by His Word and promise.

Jesus Himself uses this word. In Matthew 16:18, He says, “*On this rock I will build my church.*” Notice what Jesus does not say. He does not promise to build a monument, an institution, or an impressive organization. He promises to build *His* *ekklesia*—His gathered people. And He alone is the builder. The Church does not come into existence because people decide to be religious together; it exists because Christ calls sinners to Himself and binds them together by grace.

After Pentecost, we see this calling in action. In Acts 2, the Holy Spirit creates the Church not by strategy or structure, but through the preaching of Christ crucified and risen. Those who hear the Word are baptized, forgiven, and “devoted to the apostles’ teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of bread and the prayers.” The Church is born wherever Christ’s gifts are given and received.

The apostle Paul deepens this picture. Writing to struggling congregations, he repeatedly calls them *the church of God*—not because they are flawless, but because they belong to Him. In 1 Corinthians 12, Paul describes the Church as the Body of Christ. Every member matters, not because of usefulness or visibility, but because each has been joined to Christ Himself. The Church is not a voluntary association of like-minded people; it is a living body held together by one Lord, one faith, and one baptism.

This biblical vision gently corrects us. The Church is not something we attend when it fits our schedule, nor something we consume when it meets our preferences. It is something we *are*—called together by God, sustained by His Word, and sent into the world as witnesses of His mercy.

And here is the comfort: because the Church is Christ’s, not ours, it endures. Buildings may close, programs may change, and cultures may shift—but the *ekklesia* remains. Wherever Christ speaks forgiveness to sinners and gathers them around His gifts, there the Church lives.

Thanks be to God that He has not merely invited us to a place, but has called us into a people—His people—built on Christ alone.
